

STUDENTS POLL IN WASHINGTON

Many of you have seen the cover of NEW YORKER magazine several years ago depicting the vision of New Yorkers looking west. There was 8th Avenue, 9th Avenue, 10th Avenue, the Hudson River, New Jersey, Chicago, Kansas City, California, Hawaii, and finally Japan.

This June, Crossroads Middle School students went to see if people in Washington, D.C. could find the location of St. Louis on a map. Finding a native Washingtonians in Washington is like finding foodstamps in the clubhouse of a major league baseball team. We surveyed 86 people on the Mall in Washington and found that they came from 77 different zip codes in the United States and seven foreign countries. Thus, the survey included in the pages to follow is most accurately a reflection of how knowledgable people from throughout the United States are about the location of St. Louis. The sample is random in some vital respects: 48% are women, 52% men; 15% are black (the national average is 13%); 83% are white, and 2% oriental.




Do you think that driving privileges should be revoked when someone is found guilty of drunk driving?

DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED






If 'YES', how long?




Which of the following labels do you think best describes your political leanings?




The White House-one of the favorite attractions





ST.L. and S.L.C.

YOUR TURN gives readers of OPINION an opportunity to tell us how they feel about vital (and sometimes non-vital) issues of the day. We recognize that our mailing list of slightly over 1,100 people does not constitute a microcosm of America. Surely it would be absurd of us to ask a question like "Do you favor tuition tax credits?" and expect to get meaningful results. Nevertheless, we want to give you a chance to express your opinions on current topics, and we shall report the results back to you with each edition and hope that in some way the findings can be of value, and certainly of interest.

Only 29 faithful readers returned their Your Turns from our March issue. We found from them that 39% of them felt that Ronald Reagan was doing a good job as president while 51% rated it as poor. Fully 83% on our respondents felt that there should be no restrictions on a woman's right to an abortion and no one said that abortions should never be permitted.

Not surprisely, 93% opposed U.S. military intervention into El Salvador and the remaining 7% were not sure.

Bucking a national trend, 57% indicated that their primary source of news was newspapers while '29% said by television and 14% by radio.

The greatest division came on the issue of increasing government subsidies for artists and art programs. 52% said yes; 48% said no.
